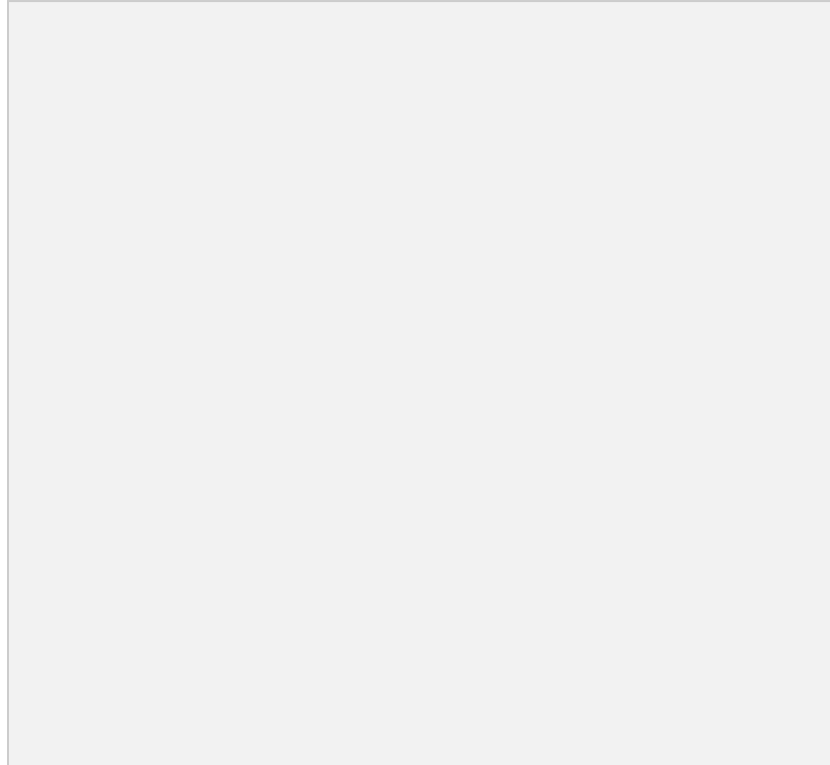


WRIGHT-PATTERSON CADET SQUADRON, GLR-OH-037



Description: Azure trimmed Gules a bendlet Argent mullets, Or Wright Flyer sinister chief, Argent triangle with Gules three-bladed propeller at dexter base, Argent inscription “WRIGHT-PATTERSON SQ” upon Azure trimmed Gules scroll beneath base.

Significance: The blue and red signify the affiliation of the squadron with the U.S. Air Force and the close relationship the squadron has with Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. The golden Wright Flyer highlights the aviation history of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base and the Dayton area, especially the research and development during aviation’s “Golden Era” and which continues to this day. The three-bladed propellor stands for Civil Air Patrol’s three missions of Aerospace Education, Emergency Services, and Cadet Programs, and signifies the squadron’s involvement in all three missions. These objects are bisected by the seven silver stars signifying the squadron’s subordination to Group VII, CAP. Finally, Wright-Patterson is spelled out in the name to further highlight the association of the squadron with the Air Force Base.
